The DOCK Responds to COVID-19

As a community developer, one of Neighbor Up Brevard's guiding principles is listening to the felt needs of the communities we serve. While everyone is feeling the effects of COVID-19, the effects are experienced disproportionately in vulnerable communities, such as the Booker T. Washington neighborhood – home of the DOCK and Greater Heights.

The DOCK typically serves 150 at risk youth per year – 100% coming from low income households. For many, that translates to families surviving on less than \$25,000 annually. The vast majority (87%) are single female-headed households. They strive to balance long working hours with care for their children. Some youth have parents absent from their lives, due to incarceration or other factors. These dynamics have negative implications on youth's academic careers. DOCK children often begin school already lagging behind their peers.

These factors which already present significant challenges to DOCK youth, have been exacerbated by the COVID-19 crisis. Since March, 60% of DOCK families report some/ all lost income. Additionally, not all homes were equipped with the technology to support online learning. Many parents are essential employees – unable to work remotely and therefore, unavailable to oversee and support online learning. In some cases, parents or grandparents raising grandkids do not have the educational background needed to guide their children or teens.

Since March, DOCK staff have worked quickly and effectively to respond to these needs as they evolve. Early on, this meant regular food distribution in the neighborhood and making sure DOCK youth had access to the technology required for online learning. Over the summer, it meant working with each family to determine the greatest needs for childcare and academic assistance; and operating a 10-week summer camp at 50% capacity for those youth. Currently, the priorities have evolved again to serve both youth that are returning to in-person learning, and those who will attend virtually due to high risk health complications of their own, or someone in their household.

While there are so many unknows this school year, we do know that whether our youth returned in-person or virtually, many face increased academic challenges as a result of school closures and online learning in the last nine weeks of the 2019-20 school year. A recent article in the New York Times estimates that "when all of the impacts are taken into account, the average student could fall seven months behind academically, while black and Hispanic students could experience even greater learning losses, equivalent to 10 months for black children and nine months for Latinos."

In summary, the "summer slide," a phrase used to describe academic losses over the summer months, has become the "COVID slide," with minority youth experiencing greater academic losses. DOCK youth (of whom 78% are Black or Hispanic) – whether learning online or virtually – will require more academic assistance than ever to remain on target with their peers.

Our overarching goal at the DOCK has always been, and continues to be, helping children to compete more effectively with their peers today and providing them with critical skills and knowledge they need for future success. We believe it is important to set measurable, time-bound objectives, and to challenge ourselves and the children to achieve even more each year. One critical metric is academic achievement – measured by report cards, advancing from grade to grade and graduation rates. Our goal is to maintain a grade point average of 2.5 or higher (the graduation requirement is 2.0).

Eau Gallie High School Principal, Jeremy Salmon, sees the DOCK as a critical partner in mitigating the unfortunate statistics we expect to play out academically. He said, "The DOCK is a community resource that fills the gap in our students' lives that encompasses both academic and social emotional support. This new reality of the pandemic has in many cases broadened and increased the needs of many of our most challenged and at-risk students. We value deeply the partnership that has been developed between the DOCK and EGHS because it is good for our kids."

Leadership Development & Neighborhood Revitalization

The practices of hiring Junior Leaders at the DOCK and residents of the surrounding neighborhood at Evans Center is Christian Community Development in action!

According to the Christian Community Development Association, of which Neighbor Up Brevard is a member, the most effective way to stabilize a struggling neighborhood for the long term and fill gaps in spiritual and economic leadership is by raising up Christian leaders within the community who will remain there to live and lead.

For many young people living in struggling communities, success is often defined as being able to move away. Valuing escapism has created a talent drain on those communities. The CCDA website sites that, "Leadership development is possible only when there is longevity of ministry. All too often people are guilty of trying to have quick fixes in poor neighborhoods. Leadership development is of the highest priority in Christian Community Development."

The key to keeping local youth invested in their community is a dynamic youth ministry, like the DOCK, that is reaching young people with the good news of Jesus Christ and then equipping them to become faithful followers, and effective community leaders who love their neighbors, and have the skills and abilities to lead churches, organizations and other institutions that bring sustainable health to our communities.

DOCK Teens Take on Leadership Roles

Neighbor Up Brevard staff is known to say, "The DOCK runs on volunteers!" In a typical week, about 35 volunteers deliver 100+ hours of service! When the COVID pandemic struck, we were faced with the dual challenge of students needing more academic assistance and a reduced volunteer corps. Many of our volunteers are of retirement age, and therefore, at greater risk of contracting COVID-19.

This situation called for DOCK teens to the rescue! We utilized 10 "Junior Leaders" to help staff the summer program. Junior Leaders are DOCK teens and/or DOCK graduates currently enrolled in college, who were hired to provide academics, character building and life skills programming. Funding for the summer was made possible through the Melbourne Police Department and CARES Act funds (via the City of Melbourne). Employing DOCK teens reduced risk of spread as several of the teens are older siblings of the youth. We experienced no cases of COVID among participants this summer. We also provided much needed employment for teens in the area!

One such teen is Tara*, a junior at Eau Gallie High School, who has attended the DOCK since she was 9. Tara lives with her mom and two siblings. She aspires to join the U.S. Army while continuing to cultivate her artistic skills. This summer, Tara had the opportunity to help her mom with household expenses and save a little money. She earned close to \$2000 by working at DOCK summer camp each day. Tara also went to another job from 5 pm to 11 pm, but she claims the Junior Leader experience was more rewarding. Her favorite parts were being rewarded with the kids' smiles and learning how to transition a 6-year old on the verge of a meltdown to calm and relaxed.

Besides filling the vital function of supporting DOCK children academically, it should be noted that the long-term benefits of the DOCK Jr Leader program are immeasurable. College is not a foregone conclusion for DOCK youth. DOCK graduates who attend college are often the first in their families to do so. Children at the DOCK look up to their Jr Leaders and are watching as these teens and college students carve out their own career paths. Their example and mentoring will light a path out of poverty.

Evans Hires Neighborhood Leaders

ministry training was no longer available to Hazel, her intentions to serve kept her on a ministerial path. From a position where she planned children's after school programs to coordinating lunch programs at a local Christian school, Hazel says, "I believe in Jesus Christ and I just follow His voice."

When Hazel heard that her neighborhood store was hiring, she followed that voice again, and was hired by Market Manager, Arthur Derico, as his Assistant Manager. Hazel says that the new skills she is learning are pulling her out of her comfort zone and forcing her to learn more about areas required to keep the store running smoothly – like inventory and accounting.

Hazel met her husband, Minor Walker, 22 years ago when their best friends were dating. Minor is a veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps and an engineer by training, who eventually followed his heart to culinary school. Today, he teaches cooking classes at Evans Center and is the baker at Evans market. Ironically, this position is somewhat of a homecoming for Minor, as his childhood home was on site in one of the apartments above Mr. Ross Evans original grocery store.

Today, Hazel and Minor are fixtures of the community store and live out the store's slogan, #communitystrong. Evans is more than a store. It is a place where homeless persons, seniors, and others received free meals and/ or groceries during the COVID lockdown; where children have a safe place to visit and where teens find their first jobs. As Evans Center employees, Hazel and Minor embody what it means to lead and serve.

As an employee of Gifts from the Heart Shop, Carolina was able to put her retail experience to good use. Her favorite memories of the job were setting up the store and "seeing the faces of the parents who wouldn't have otherwise been able to purchase those gifts." Carolina adds, "You could see the happiness on their faces!"



Keith and Kerry Johnson became aware of Neighbor Up Brevard years ago when they learned about this mission through their church, Trinity Wellsprings. (Trinity has been a mission partner since 2001 when Neighbor Up was launched!) Keith and Kerry recall helping with projects at Greater Heights apartments, such as power washing and painting.

Kerry, an avid reader and serious organizer, then made her away across the street and got involved at the DOCK library. For the past several years, she and some other Trinity women have been creating systems to keep our books organized by reading level. As summer approaches, Kerry even recruits prizes from local businesses to incentivize the kids to read. Recently, Kerry and the DOCK staff recognized that the library should also be organized so that Accelerated Reader (AR) books are easy to identify. AR is a system used to track kids' reading and comprehension skills. Kerry recruited a local Girl Scout troop to help with the task, and they were able to earn their Silver Award, which entails identifying a project they care about and spending a minimum of 50 hours to see it to completion.

When COVID struck and a need presented itself in the neighborhood surrounding the Evans Center, Keith and Kerry both jumped into action to deliver weekly groceries to the elderly. This translated to 110+ deliveries over the course of eight weeks and 20 volunteer hours. When the Evans Community Market re-opened, both were on the scene again to employ their
